

2022 Camporee Antique Powerland April 29 - May 1, 2022

This Leaders Guide is designed to give you some basic information, and will be supplemented, as we get closer to the actual event. General Information

<u>Style of Camping</u>: Troops can elect to camp backpack style or drive-in camping style. Campsite judging will be geared to the style declared by the troop upon check-in.

<u>Check-in</u>: Plan to arrive on Friday, April 29, during the hours of 5:00-8:00 PM. Vehicle parking is close to campsites, but some carrying of gear will be required. (Vehicles cannot drive right to campsites.) Whoever arrives from the unit first should be prepared to handle the unit's registration process, which includes receiving a campsite assignment. Please do not drive cars into the camp without first checking and receiving vehicle passes.

<u>Registration</u>: The registration form included in this packet should be filled out in advance and presented at the headquarters when you check-in your troop. Having it completed prior to arrival will greatly reduce the time it takes to register. Every scout and adult who is camping overnight MUST be registered on the form and online. We will need all adults who are training to register online as well, so we are able to know who is in camp at all times..

<u>SPL/Unit Leader Meeting</u>: There will be an event information meeting at 9:00 PM on Friday evening at Camporee Headquarters. The Unit SPL (or acting youth unit leader) and Scoutmaster (or acting adult unit leader) should attend. All units must be represented at this meeting. The final schedule of events, checkout procedure information, and other important information will be distributed at this meeting.

Training: IOLS is being offered for free, but all who are attending must register for the session. You are encouraged to register your entire unit using the online registration process on the Council's website Online Registration link - http://www.cpcbsa.org/districts

Fees:

Early Bird Registration is \$15 until April 8, 2022 Afterwards it will be \$20 until April 22, 2022. NO registration at the door - no money transactions available.

Staff fee is \$10 to include meals, and program supplies. Cub Scouts and chaperones who are visiting for the DAY are FREE, but all must be registered with their unit, and check in with headquarters before entering the event.

<u>Patches</u>: Each registered Scout and Scouter will receive a souvenir patch at the end of the weekend in their Unit Checkout packet after the site is inspected before departure.

<u>Medical Records</u>: Each troop should bring their health and medical record forms for all Scouts and Leaders that are attending the Camporee. If your troop will have trained medical professionals (doctors, paramedics, first responders, etc.), please inform us at check-in.

<u>Facilities</u>: Units will set up camp following the Guide to Safe Scouting per linked troops. Units will be assigned based on unit size. There will be a map with unit placement updated Friday evening, as units arrive at check in.

<u>Uniforms</u>: Full Scout uniforms are to be worn at general assemblies, campfire and chapel. Activity uniforms consisting of Scout pants or shorts, scout socks and belt, and a troop t-shirt (or some Scouting tee-shirt) must be worn at all other times. This applies to staff as well.

<u>Cooking</u>: Liquid fuel and compressed gas stoves may be used in accordance with BSA policy. Scoutmasters are responsible for storage of liquid fuel in the campsite area. NO Charcoal.

Fires: NO OPEN FLAME FIRES ARE PERMITTED due to a fire ban by local Fire Marshall.

<u>Water</u>: Water spigots will be available for our water. Bring water jugs and remember to conserve.

Garbage: Dumpster will be provided, if full, then the unit takes home their own.

Menu and Duty Roster: Each patrol should have its menu and duty roster <u>posted</u>. Samples are included in this booklet. These should be readable by anyone who may visit their site.

Camporee Activities: Saturday will consist of interpatrol competition events.

Who competes? Only a troop's regularly organized patrols should compete. "Ringer" patrols made up for just the Camporee are not in keeping with good Scout Spirit. Troops are encouraged to have older Scouts act as Troop Guides.

Leadership: The events will be led by our District's Youth staff. Instructions will be presented to the patrol leader at the beginning of each event.

Competition Areas: Separate areas will be laid out for each of the events. When first registering at the Camporee, patrols will be assigned a starting station for Saturday's activities and circulate through the events until they have completed all event stations. As in previous years, patrols may go from station to station in whatever order they choose. It does not need to be in numerical order. Patrols should be advised that different stations will require different lengths of time to complete.

Adult Training: Saturday's schedule includes adult leader training sessions for IOLS - Introduction to Outdoor Leader Skills and BALOO - Basic Adult Leader Outdoor Orientation.

<u>Skills and Knowledge Required to be Successful</u>: As in past years, activity events will utilize Scouting skills, teamwork, and an emphasis on the Patrol method. The following list of activities are great skills to develop and use at Camporee, however, at this time, the youth

Staff are still creating a fun filled program and final list will be made available to the SPLs on Friday evening prior to the event - POSSIBLE stations may be:

Patrol teamwork

Map & compass skills

Good menu planning

Knot tying

OA Village

Patrol communication

Minimum impact camping

Demonstrated patrol yells

Points will also be gained for demonstrating scout and patrol spirit, teamwork, proper uniforming, having a patrol flag at the events, and active participation throughout the day

In addition to the primary activity stations, there will be additional activities available to patrols. These include:

Visiting additional activities available throughout the event

Campfire participation

Service projects

Museums are open, and will have demonstrations throughout the day

<u>Campsite Inspections:</u> Troops can choose to be judged as a backpack troop or as a drive-in camping troop. All patrols in the troop must be judged under the one criteria declared by the troop. Please plan on having an adult in camp to help identify patrol areas (staff will try to pre-assign times needed. Inspections will occur during Saturday's activities period).

<u>Judging and Recognitions:</u> Points will be awarded for action events, campsite inspections, and bonus participation activities. Awards will be presented at Sunday morning's final Camporee Assembly.

<u>Service Projects</u>: There will be a service project for ALL units to participate. The service projects will be explained at the Friday night SPL and unit Leaders' meeting.

<u>Visitors</u>: All visitors must check in at the Camporee headquarters prior to visiting the Camporee grounds. Parents, siblings, and supervised Cub scouts are invited to watch the events and the campfire on Saturday. Visitors should show up no later than 6:30 p.m. for the campfire.

<u>Camporee Staff</u>: The Camporee staff will consist of approved Scouts, and members of the Order of the Arrow, or District scouts. Contact **Jackie Dannemiller**, Camporee Chairman, <u>njdannemiller@gmail.com</u> and provide a name of who you recommend to serve on staff. All Camporee Staff member selection will take place in advance of the Camporee and not on the day

prior to the event. Staff need to register online and pay the \$10 fee before April 1, so enough program supplies, food and patches are available.

Camp Departure: Camporee check-out procedures will be provided at Friday's SPL/Unit Leader Meeting. Some units will be leaving on Saturday evening and will need to have their campsite inspection and checkout before dark. They can attend the campfire, but their site should be cleared for inspection. Be sure that you inform Jackie Dannemiller, Camporee Chairman, before your departure for a site inspection. All units are expected to follow the same guidelines of leaving their site clean, taking out their trash, and checking out with the proper Camporee Staff before departure. The Camporee officially ends at the Final Camporee Assembly on Sunday. All Units must be out of the Camporee site by Sunday, 10:30 a.m.

- 5:00 PM Registration opens / Troops start arriving


Webelos - Webelos and AOLs Oct. 1-3, 2021

Webelos/AOLs are invited to attend the entire weekend. Local Troops are encouraged to invite their feeder packs to attend as their guests, providing a Troop Guide to support their dens while completing the activities offered.

Webelos Camping:

A Webelos Scout may participate in overnight den camping when supervised by an adult. In most cases, the Webelos Scout will be under the supervision of his parent or guardian. It is essential that each Webelos Scout be under the supervision of a parent-approved adult. Joint Webelos den/troop campouts including the parents of the Webelos Scouts are encouraged to strengthen ties between the pack and troop. Den leaders, pack leaders, and parents are expected to accompany the boys on approved trips. There will be a designated area for family style camping. Scouts will need to bring their own camping equipment, etc. and should be sponsored by their local Troop units. Registration is online, and all must be registered to participate.
