Spirit Lake Webelos Wood/Bigfoot Search Leader's Guide

Welcome Unit Leaders, Parents, and Scouts:

Webelos Wood/Bigfoot Search will be at Camp Lewis, as it has been for many years. Webelos and Bears are welcome to come out on Friday night **after 6 pm**. We will have a short campfire program and hopefully, the weather will allow us some star gazing

Remember it is required that each Bear or Webelos staying the night have a parent or adult (21+) attend with them as per BSA Guidelines to Safe Scouting. You are welcome to come for the day for the same cost (\$15). Overnight camping is not required for the event but is for some rank requirements. No siblings that are **not registered** with BSA and do not have the **required rank of Bear or Webelos** are allowed to attend this event. Feel free to email us if you have any questions about this.

This is a wilderness type of camp. All scouts & adults will be tent camping in the big meadow. There is potable water on site so you can bring containers to fill and carry to your campsite. Wheelbarrows or carts are suggested to help transport your camp items to and from the field. Bathrooms are pit toilets (kybos). There are no showers available on site.

Lovely, toasty fires are permitted in above-ground fire pits if you bring your own firewood. **(unless a burning ban is in effect)** Absolutely no fires on the ground. **As of right now, there is a burn ban in effect so no fires will be allowed. We will keep you updated.**

Throughout the day on Saturday, each group, also known as patrols, will be going from station to station throughout the camp; some before lunch and some after lunch. Various Scout BSA troops will be conducting the 35 minutes long sessions, teaching special scout skills.

If you need to leave camp at any time, please let the staff know and sign the notebook at the trading post where you can check in and out. Staff members can be found most times at the main shelter, just off the parking lot, wearing staff shirts.

We will always have a medic on-site during the weekend. If you have any special needs, please let us know when you check in. Medical forms are required at camp in case of emergency, but you can keep these at your campsite.

We hope that everyone will have a great time enjoying the Outing part of Scouting.

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Items to Bring

- 1) Webelos Woods is in March and Bigfoot Search is in September. With that in mind, we could have fall-like weather during the day. This means it could be either sunny or it could rainy. At night **jackets or sweatshirts** is a good thing to bring. Leave them in your car for easy access if you don't want to lug them to the campsite, but better safe than sorry. Also, it might be a good idea to have rain gear. Be Prepared! Bring an extra change of clothes and dress in layers to keep the cold out. We strongly recommend that you and your group wear pants, not shorts. Unfortunately, bugs, blackberry vines, stinging nettle, poison oak, etc. are prevalent, so please take these things into account when you are packing for the weekend. Also please make sure that the clothing is appropriate for a youth event. No beer or tobacco ads on caps or clothing or anything else that might be considered inappropriate.
- 2) **Good sturdy boots or shoes** are required. No open-toed shoes, sandals, etc. There are too many things in, on, and around the paths to injure unprotected toes and feet. This goes for adults as well as youth.
- 3) **Uniforms** are required for morning and evening flag ceremonies. If your Unit has a special uniform code, then please follow it. However, for this event, we ask that the uniform shirt be worn by both scouts and adults if you have them. There will be enough time to change in and out of the Class A uniform before and after the ceremonies.
- 4) **Hot dog lunch** will be provided on Saturday, but the other meals will be up to the individual units. **We do not have dietary substitutions. Please bring your own food if this is the case. Let us know at check-in.** Please bring the proper equipment to prepare those meals. Propane stoves on tables work the best. Make sure you have a wash station to clean up. Please, please, no dumping of foodstuff in the woods. We don't want to attract mini bears or other wonderfully exotic wildlife.
- 5) **Pop-ups canopy** or some sort of portable cover is advised. The meadow does not have a shelter that is available for camping or storing gear. Camping gear will solely be the responsibility of the groups at this event.

Camping Gear List

- 1) **Tents with rain fly & a ground tarp** are a must. Scouts will probably assign Tent Buddies in the den before coming to Camp Lewis, but adults will need a separate tent. Adults are not permitted to share a tent with any scout other than their own.
- 2) **A popup canopy, a dining fly, tarps**, or any type of cover against the elements is extremely helpful but not required.
- 3) **Cooking gear** like pots, pans, serving spoons, foil, etc. are the individual scout's responsibility to provide. Propane stoves for preparing these meals are welcome. However, please be aware that the National Policy on the use of fuels must be followed by keeping all liquid fuel and spare propane tanks in your locked vehicle.

- 4) **Fire barrels, patio burners** or anything that will contain a fire at least 3" off the ground can keep fingers warm and toasty. Fires must be attended at all times or completely extinguished before leaving your campsite. You will have to provide your own firewood since there is absolutely no brush gathering or timber cutting permitted. You must also haul out your ashes. Do not throw them in the woods. **Again, as of right now there is a burn ban so fires are not allowed at camp. We will keep you updated if there is a change.**
- 5) **Water containers and water bottles** will be necessary throughout your stay. There is potable water on sight by the main parking lot and on the path towards Ft. Simcoe in a big meadow. Remember water is heavy so wheelbarrows or carts can help.
- 6) **Sleeping bags and pads/mattresses.**
- 7) **A cart(s) or wagon(s)** to transport your gear from the main parking lot to the big meadow.
- 8) This is a primitive camp with pit toilets (**kybos**). There are NO showers. Hand sanitizer and toilet paper will be provided in each kybo, but you may wish to bring your own just in case. We will do our best to keep the kybos stocked and clean, but please help us by reminding scouts to close the lid when they are finished and to only deposit toilet paper into the kybo.
- 9) **Headlamps are a MUST.** As we enter the Fall season, each of us really needs to walk around with a light source.

Rules of the Road

Welcome to Short Term Property use of our Camp!

We hope you are looking forward to your upcoming visit to our camp. Below are a few rules of the road when using our camp property.

- Arrival time is at 5 pm and departure time is 3 pm.
- Please check in with Campmaster upon arrival. We have a caretaker on location if the gate is locked upon arrival.
- If you are unable to attend for any reason PLEASE notify the office, 503) 225-5759.
- All vehicles need to be kept on gravel roads or in the parking lots.
- Cut no trees.
- Campfires in established fire pits only.
 - You may bring your own firewood.
 - NO FLAMES IN TENTS or BUILDINGS!
 - No open flame within ten feet of any tent.
 - Proper storage of flammable liquids and matches.
 - All gas stoves, lanterns, and other equipment used only under direct adult supervision.
 - No fireworks or other explosives in camp.
- Camping in designated campsites only
- Stay away from all water
- Smoking in vehicles only at the top of the hill.
- No intoxicating beverages or illegal drugs are allowed on Scout property
- Pets ARE NOT allowed (unless they are licensed services animals in camp).
- Complete Medical Forms A and B (only C if the campout is over 72 hours), to be kept with the unit during campout.
- It is highly recommended your group designate a responsible person for first aid and emergency care. Who is currently certified in standard first aide and CPR from a nationally recognized provider?

- Covid requirements will be determined by the Council and the camp committee will be relayed to the Campmaster(s) upon arrival.

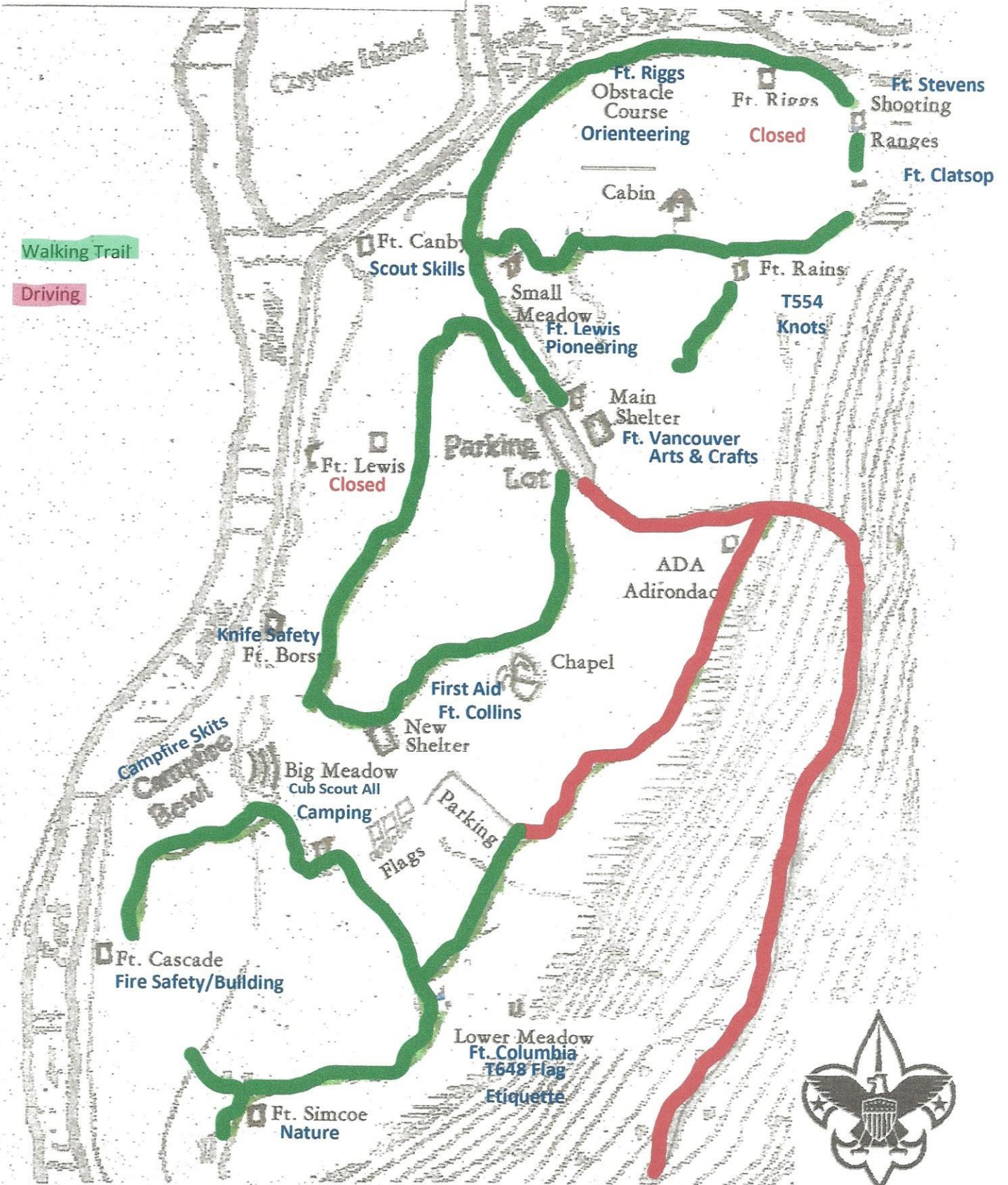

 - III. Open a can with the can opener tool on a pocketknife
 - IV. Remove and replace the screws on an object with the screwdriver tool on a pocketknife
 - V. Open a letter

Bear Necessities

1. A. Daytime or Overnight campout with your pack or family
2. Make a list of items you should take with you on the activity selected in Requirement 1
3. Help set up a Tent, determine a good spot for your tent and explain why you picked it
4. Demonstrate how to tie two half hitches and explain what it is used for

Fur, Feathers & Ferns

3. Name one animal that has become extinct in the last 100 years and one animal that is currently endangered. Explain what caused their declines
4. Observe wildlife from a distance, describe what you see
5. Use a magnifying glass to examine plants more closely. Describe what you saw through the magnifying glass that you could not see without it

1. Create an "exploding" craft stick reaction.
2. Make two simple pulleys and use them to move objects.

Cast Iron Chef

1. Plan a menu for a balanced meal for your den or family. Determine the budget for the meal. If possible, shop for the item on your menu. Stay within budget.
2. Prepare a balanced meal for your den or family. If possible, use one of these methods for the preparation of part of the meal: camp stove, dutch oven, box oven, solar oven, open campfire, or charcoal grill. Demonstrate an understanding of food safety practices while preparing the meal.
3. Use tinder, kindling and fuel wood to demonstrate how to build a fire in an appropriate outdoor location. Show how to safely light the fire to burn safely, safely extinguish the flames with minimal impact to the fire site.

First Responder

1. Explain what first aid is. Tell what you should do after an accident
2. Show what to do in hurry case of first aid: Serious bleeding, heart attack or sudden cardiac arret, stopped breathing, stroke, poisoning.
3. Show how to help a choking victim
4. Show how to treat shock
5. Demonstrate how to treat the following:
 - Cuts and scratches
 - Burns and scalds
 - Sunburn
 - Blisters on the hand or foot
 - Tick Bits
 - Bites and stings of other insects
 - Venomous snakebites
 - Nosebleed
 - Frostbite
6. Put together a simple first-aid kit. Explain what you included and how to use each item correctly.

- (2.) Assemble a first-aid kit suitable for your hike or activity.
- (3.) Recite the outdoor code and leave no trace principles. Talk about how you can demonstrate them
- (5.) Describe and identify from photos any poisonous plants and dangerous animals and insects you might encounter on your hike or activity.

1. Explain the history of the United States Flag. Show how to properly display the flag in public and help lead a flag ceremony.

2. Learn about and describe your rights and duties as a citizen and explain what it means to be loyal to your country.

Outdoor Adventurer

○ Option A:

1. With the help of your den leader or family, plan and participate in a campout.
2. On arrival at the campout, with your den and den leader or family, determine where to set up your tent. Demonstrate knowledge of what makes a good tent site and what makes a bad one. Set up your tent without help from an adult.
3. Once your tents are set up discuss with your den or family what actions you should take in the case of the following extreme weather events: (A) Severe rainstorm causing flooding, (B) Severe thunderstorm with lightning and tornados, (C) earthquake or disasters that will require evacuation.
4. Show how to tie a bowline. Explain when this knot should be used and why.
5. Recite the Outdoor code and leave no trace principles for kids from memory. Talk about how you can demonstrate them while you are working on your Arrow of Light.

○ Option B:

1. With the help of your den leader or family plan and participate in an outdoor activity.
2. On arrival at the campout, with your den and den leader or family, determine where to set up your tent. Demonstrate knowledge of what makes a good tent site and what makes a bad one. Set up your tent without help from an adult.
3. Show how to tie a bowline. Explain when this knot should be used and why.
4. Recite the Outdoor code and leave no trace principles for kids from memory. Talk about how you can demonstrate them while you are working on your Arrow of Light.

Scouting Adventure

- 5a. Show how to tie a square knot, two half hitches, and a taut-line. Explain how each knot is used.
- 5b. Show the proper care of a rope by learning how to whip and fuse the ends of different kinds of rope.
6. Demonstrate your knowledge of the pocketknife safety rules and the pocketknife pledge. If you have not already done so earn your whittling chip. (requirements will be provided to the units)

Art Explosion

- 3a. Draw or paint an original picture outdoors, using the art materials of your choice.
- 3b. Use clay to sculpt a simple form
- 3c. Create an object using clay that can be fired, baked in the oven or air dried.
- 3d. Create a freestanding sculpture or mobile using wood, metal, papier-mache or found recycled objects.

- 2d. Discuss what to do if you become lost in the woods. Tell what the letters "S-T-O-P" stand for. Tell what the universal emergency signal is. Describe three way to signal for help. Demonstrate one of them. Describe what you can do to help rescuers find you.
- 2d. Make a list of four qualities you think a leader should have in an emergency and why they are important. Pick two of them and act them out for your den. Describe how each relates to a point of the scout law. Describe how working on this adventure gave you a better understanding of the Scout motto "Be Prepared"

4. Learn about the bird flyways closest to your home. Find out which bird you see.
5. Watch at least four wild creatures in the wild. Describe the kind of place where you saw them and tell what they were doing.
7. Give examples of at least two of the following
 - A: A producer, a consumer, and a decomposer in the food chain of an ecosystem
 - B: One way humans have changed the balance of nature
 - C: How you can help protect the balance of nature

Into the Woods

1. Identify two different groups of trees and the parts of a tree.
2. Identify four trees common to the area where you live. Tell whether they are native to your area. Tell how both wildlife and humans use them.
3. Identify four plants common to the area where you live. Tell which animals use them and for what purpose.
6. Explain how the growth rings of a tree trunk tell its life story. Describe different types of tree bark and explain what the bark does for the tree.
